Guidelines for Transferring Courses

In order for the Honors College to accept a course for Honors credit it must meet the following requirements:

1. Interdisciplinary - The course must combine disciplines and focus on using those disciplines to understand or solve a problem. You should be able to identify a few specific disciplines at play in the course.
2. Seminar-style - The course must be mainly discussion based.
3. Not multiple-choice exam based - The grade for the class must come from papers/presentations/short answer or essay exams.

We will be more lenient with courses students take while abroad as we know you have limited options, however, they still should meet most of these requirements.

There are only a few courses at UNM that the Honors College will accept including HMMV courses and Sociology 346/347: Health and Social Inequalities. Even if the course will be automatically accepted by the Honors College, you must still complete this form.

Other courses taken at UNM will be scrutinized and absolutely must meet the requirements above as students have the option to take a course within the Honors College every semester or work out an independent study if they are physically at UNM.
